Lead singer Will Taylor explained: "We want to let people know what they're in for with this record so we've made a lyric book with all the songs and they can read along.

"We want to make it less indie and rock, we want to avoid those areas and associations. We don't want to be an indie band.

"We want to be artists and draw from film, theatre and other places — and get that across through the medium of being in a band.

"We find the indie band realm very restrictive and uninspiring."

The group hit The Garage in Glasgow next Sunday night and the crowd reaction promises to be interesting.

Will said: "They'll be engaging in

Will said: "They'll be engaging in the way we want them to, which is a lot down to the lyrics.

"If they listen to the lyrics, it'll enhance the music.

"Often you don't listen to the lyrics. Maybe the sound is bad or you're whipped up by something else – but we want this tour to have the emphasis on the lyrics.

"It'll be a new thing to a lot of people and something they wouldn't experience at a normal show."

The guys are massive fans of playing north of the border. They even produced a special online image to promote their Glasgow gig featuring Billy Connolly, Lulu and Nicola Sturgeon.

Will said: "Our favourite place to play in the UK is probably Inverness. There's a good time to be had there, for some reason.

"We've got a strange love affair with Scotland.

"At the beginning of last year, we did an exclusively Scottish tour and it was a great time."

Will has also spent a lot of time in Glasgow over the last few years and his girlfriend, Nell Hudson, played Laoghaire MacKenzie in hit TV show Outlander.

He added: "We hung out a lot in Glasgow, I'd go up and join her during filming so I've got a lot of time for the people up there."

#### RACHEL McALPINE

JIM SAYS: Fife singer-songwriter Rachel McAlpine shows real depth to her talents with her latest single Please Just Go.

Previously releasing a series of accomplished acoustic EPs, she's moved further towards pop. It's a cool new sound, with a subtle electro pop It paid dividends almost immediately, named

single of the week on Janice Forsyth's BBC Radio Scotland show. It also saw her interviewed live on air by Edi Stark, filling in that week. It's not the first time Rachel has veered towards electronic music. Early this year she collaborated with ALEX (aka Edinburgh based musician/producer Alex Davidson) on his Youth EP, released through New York's NewRetroWave label.

When I caught up with her last week she was just about to head to the Big Apple to shoot a new video with ALEX. She said: "I met Alex a few years back when he helped me get my Fire EP out. He was studying at The Academy Of Music And Sound in Edinburgh. I was chosen as the artist



the team worked with to help organise recording, gigs and promotion.

"It was a great experience and helped me grow as a songwriter, and with my confidence. We kept in touch and he sent me some of his music. I was blown away with this new and exciting sound."

Now 22, Rachel first started writing music when she was 15, gigging throughout Fife and Edinburgh but she's always set her sights further afield. She said: "My love of music is matched by my love of travel. I've travelled extensively across my love of travel. I've travelled extensively across Europe over the last few years combining music with work whenever I could." After New York she heads to France to work as a paddlesports

instructor. She said: "The hope is to get some gigs when I'm in France and hopefully let people there hear my music. It should be a big influence on the songs for my next EP at the end of the year."

Rachel revealed that travel influenced Please Just Go. She said "It's about a blossoming travel romance that doesn't work out. Not a particularly uplifting subject matter, but I love how the pulsing

uplifting subject matter, but I love how the pulsing synths and edginess to the track manage to convey the atmosphere without being downbeat."

The single was recorded at Loopmaniac studios in Dunfermline, run by Liam Saunders who also produced it. Rachel said: "I had asked Liam to produce the track, but he approached me pretty early on in the pre-production stage to ask if I would be interested in it being the first release on his new label."

Liam added: "The initial plan for the label was a vinyl release for an amazing album by alt. folk duo
